The aim of the Prevent strategy is to reduce the threat to the UK from terrorism by stopping people being drawn into terrorism.

We are required to take a risk-based approach to the Prevent duty, under paragraph 14 of the Home Office's statutory guidance

respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Extremism isn't exclusive to any section of society and can take many forms Extremism is defined as vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual

Radicalisation is defined as the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and extremist ideologies associated with terrorist groups

National - The current government national threat level from terrorism is substantial.

79% in 2013–15, 43% in 2010–12, 41% in 2007–09 and 8% in pre-2007 (Ministry of Justice, 2022. radicalisation, including those who primarily radicalised online and those radicalised via online and offline influences (92% in 2019–21, 84% in 2016–18, Nationally, from the period before 2007 up to 2021, there was an increase in the proportion of individuals subject to some degree of online

Risk is students or families being radicalised online

Local - There were serious and sustained levels of violence towards the local police authority in the summer of 2024 as a result of Far right movements

Risk is students or families being influenced by the Far right to commit offences.
